WELLS FARGO PINOLE MURAL DEDICATED JULY 25

Wells Fargo Bank unveiled its mural of Pinole's history on July 25 in a ceremony that featured descendants of prominent Pinole residents in the mural in a video, talking about their families and their contributions to the city's history.

Mike and Michele LeFebvre, son and daughter of Lawrence

“Big Red” LeFebvre, manager of the Pinole Merchants baseball team, and Susan Fernandez, great-granddaughter of Bernardo Fernandez, one of the founders of Pinole, were featured in the video produced by the bank's communications department. All three attended the event.

The 12-foot by 4-foot mural was installed on the back wall of the bank

at 1374 Fitzgerald Drive.

Pinole Historical Society President Marcia Kalapus and Vice President Jeff Rubin, along with Councilman Roy Swearingen, Chamber of Commerce President Dina Rosales, and Wells Fargo Bank Regional President Micky Randhawa, made brief remarks before the nearly six-minute video was shown to attendees.

The video will be shown on Pinole Community TV, channel 28, beginning July 29.

The mural includes images of a map of the El Rancho Pinole land grant, the Martinez Adobe, downtown Pinole in the 1920s, Lawrence “Big Red” LeFebvre, who managed the Pinole Merchants baseball team, the Pinole-Hercules School (the Old School),

the Pinole Fire Department (and Chief Wallace “Pepper” Martin) in the early 1950s, the 1904 class of the Plaza School (featuring teacher Frances Ellerhorst), the original Santa Fe depot, Hercules Powder Works employees, Bernardo Fernandez, and the seal of the city of Pinole.

Wells Fargo Bank welcomes visitors to its Pinole branch to view the mural, which is accompanied by a legend that explains the history of each image.

This mural is one of many in Wells Fargo’s Community Mural Program, which provides a unique visual enhancement to the customer experience in the bank’s branches. Designed to be a snapshot of Turn-of-the[Last]-Century America, historic images are chosen that convey a sense of history, tradition, stability, longevity, optimism, and progress.

A typical mural design combines Wells Fargo images and local images that reflect the history and diversity of the community. An accompanying mural key describes each historical image used in the mural, and credits the source. The Pinole Historical Society provided Wells Fargo with all of the local photos and images.

In return, Wells Fargo donated \$500 to the Pinole Historical Society, for which we are very grateful.

They have brass grommets attached to heavy canvas pole ends and combine lustrous beauty with superior wearing quality and excellent fly ability.

These flags are made by the Valley Forge Flag Company, and are directly comparable in both

quality and durability to flags sold by leading home improvement and retail stores for up to \$30. This size is suitable for flagpoles from 15 to 20 feet.

These flags are only \$25, including sales tax. We'll deliver if you live in West Contra Costa County. If you live out of the area we will ship the flag to you for an additional \$5. We also have flag poles for \$5. We do not ship the poles.


You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.





Richmond Home Front Festival will feature kids' activities

The 7th Annual Home Front Festival on Saturday, October 12, will feature interactive activities for family members of all ages.

Piggy-backing on Rosie the Riveters' motto, "We Can Do It," the festival will present "Kids Can Do It," and focus on engaging youth in their Richmond history.

The event will be held from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Craneway Pavilion, located in the historic Ford Point Building.

The event will again sponsor the Historic Duck, an amphibious vehicle from the WWII era, to take families on water tours, with an oral history of the nearby shipyards of Richmond, other historic landmarks. Historic WWII buses will shuttle festival-goers from the main festival site to the SS Red Oak Victory Ship.

The festival includes the YMCA's Rosie the Riveter Family Run/Walk.

Emigrants who traveled the overland trail to California in the mid 19th century hoped the journey would lead to an improvement in their health.

California's reputation for healthiness is well known, but emigrants' discussions of their search for health during the journey adds something new to this story.

These travelers talked about how the journey allowed them to

access the perceived better health of Indians of the Plains, such as the Sioux.

The story of California and health in the 19th century may be as much about the journey to the Pacific as it was about California itself.



TWO DOCUMENTARIES BEING SHOWN AT ROSIE THE RIVETER/ WWII HOME FRONT NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

A new documentary film called “The War At Home” is being shown daily at the Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park. The 25-minute film screens hourly at the park’s Visitor Education Center, starting at 11 a.m.. The last screening is at 4 p.m. It’s shown seven days a week.

“The War At Home,” produced in collaboration between the National Park Service and Signature



Communications, uses oral histories, archival materials, and personal diaries to illustrate the diversity and complexity of the World War II homefront experience, from the perspective of a number of real people who lived in different cities across the United States.

Another 16-minute documentary film, “Home Front Heroes,” which outlines the history of defense manufacturing in Richmond, during World War II, is also screened regularly, alternating with “The War At Home.”

5TH ANNUAL HOME FRONT FILM FESTIVAL PRESENTS 6 WWII-ERA FILMS ABOARD THE SS RED OAK VICTORY

The Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historical Park and the Richmond Museum of History Association will present the 5th Annual WWII Home Front Film Festival on Thursdays in July and August. The film festival will feature popular, full-length movies that were shown on the Home Front during the WWII period.

Six movies will be screened aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored ship built in Richmond during World War II.

The ship is located in historic Shipyard #3, where thousands of Americans labored to build 747 ships over the course of the war. Ship address: 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. For directions to the shipyard, call 510-237-2933 or visit www.ssredoakvictory.com/contact.htm.

Boarding is at 6:30 pm and the films begin at 7. There is a donation of \$5 to board

the ship and enjoy ship exhibits prior to the film. Please note: the ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be

able to climb gangplank (40 feet, of stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard ship.


The movies include:

August 8: The Story of G.I. Joe (1945). Starring Burgess Meredith and Robert Mitchum. As WWII came to an end, this film was a realistic look at what it was like to serve as a soldier in the European Theater. It’s based on the life of the famed war correspondent Ernie Pyle, with Meredith playing the correspondent.

August 22: Dear Ruth (1946). starring William Holden and Joan Caulfield. Based on the 1944 play, a borrowed identity has hilarious consequences.

Popcorn and refreshments will be available for purchase. A National Park Service ranger will provide an introduction to the films in

the context of the WWII Home Front.
