Cori Clark retires

THE ALLEY CAFE UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

A Pinole landmark closed its doors — albeit briefly — on Sunday, June 14, when Cori Clark cooked her last batch of hashbrowns at The Alley Cafe.

The restaurant reopened on June 25 under new management. Sarah and Ken Cheung, who have operated restaurants in San Francisco, bought the cafe. Jose Arevalo (cook) and Cherrie Clark (server), formerly of The Waffle Stop, are running it.

This breakfast/lunch restaurant has been a fixture in Pinole since 1962, when former Fire Chief Alex Clark and his friend, Bob Dutra, bought the former Greenfield's Department Store building. They sold the café, reacquired it, and then sold it again.

Cori Clark's father, Dave Brandt, bought it in 1978 after the previous owner died. Cori Brandt worked for her father in the restaurant as a waitress; Dave was the cook. When Dave died in 1992, Cori (Brandt) Clark, by this time married to Alex Clark's son, Chano, took over, and had been there since.

Not much changed through the years at The Alley Café, including the food and the cook. Cori fed

generations of area residents, many of them who remember her fondly on Facebook. One Facebook writer commented about the enormous portions of hashbrown potatoes Cori served: *"She throws them down, oils them up, and fries the dickens out of them*

before they hit your plate piping hot!" Another wrote: *"Where else is there only one cook for over 40 people? Cori is the bomb!"* Still another wrote: *"This place is my morning go-to. Such a wonderful place."*

"It was a friendly place," Cori says. "I tried to involve people, make them feel comfortable and want to come back. If somebody was there by themselves and they

seemed like they wanted to talk, I always tried to find something to talk to them about.

"We served a lot of families for generations. It was a community place. It had a feel; I know you had to wait a long time, but people always got what they ordered and it was prepared with care. There was no way to do it faster, because the meal would be compromised, and we didn't want to do that.

"I thank people for their support and patronage. Our family enjoyed serving you for 37 years."



7th annual Home Front Film Festival July schedule

The National Park Service and the Richmond Museum Association continues with its 7th Annual Home Front Film Festival on Thursday evenings July and August. The film festival features popular, full-length movies that were shown on the American Home Front during WWII.

The film screenings will be presented aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored cargo ship built in Richmond during World War II. The ship is owned and operated by the Richmond Museum Association and is also part of Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park.

The SS Red Oak Victory is located in historic Shipyard #3 at 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. For directions to the shipyard, visit the Red Oak Victory at www.ssredoakvictory.com/contact.htm.

Admission is free, but there is a suggested donation of \$10 to help preserve and maintain the ship. Boarding begins at 6:30 p.m. and the films begins at 7 p.m. Popcorn and refreshments will be available for purchase aboard the ship during each screening.

Please note: The ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be able to climb the gangplank (40 feet of stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard.

Remember to wear warm clothing, as it can be chilly aboard the ship! Bad weather may force the ship staff to cancel this program for safety reasons. If it rains, please call the ship at (510) 237-2933 by 5:30 p.m. on the day of the screening to find out if the show will go on.

• **July 9:** *Casablanca* (1942), with Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman. *Casablanca* became the most popular film of the Home Front era and its popularity continues today. Join us as we recreate Rick's Café Américain aboard the ship. Dress as your favorite *Casablanca* character.

• **July 23:** *Northern Pursuit* (1943), with Errol Flynn. Royal Canadian Mounted Police Corporal Steve Wagner (Errol Flynn) tries to uncover a Nazi plot against the Allied war effort. The film was set in Canada during the early years of WWII.



'ECHOES OF WORLD WAR II – A BAY AREA PERSPECTIVE'

FILM ABOUT THE CHILDREN OF THE GREATEST GENERATION

Producer Patricia Weaver will preview her film, "Echoes of World War II – A Bay Area Perspective," at the Visitor Education Center of Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park on Saturday, July 11, at 11 a.m.

The film highlights experiences of children who lived in the Bay Area during World War II.

In describing the film, Patricia says, "As Children of the Greatest Generation, we all participated in the war effort. Those experiences — even though I was a child — stayed with me: the victory gardens, rationing, collecting all kinds of things that became

important to the war effort, fundraising for war bonds; it was a highly emotional and sometimes frightening time. However, it was also a very cooperative time for families, neighborhoods, cities, and states throughout the country as we worked together toward a common goal. It is my dream that our country could come together like that again."

As a child, Patricia was a tap dancer with a Kay Kyser's Big Band, entertaining wounded troops hospitalized at the VAs in Southern California during World War II. Still welcoming fresh challenges after a lifetime of multi-faceted entrepreneurial

accomplishments, she offered her services to the Veterans Oral History Project sponsored by the Library of Congress. Her volunteer work with the oral histories inspired her to collect interviews from local Bay Area residents who were children of the World War II era, and at the age of 78, she used these interviews to produce her first film, "Echoes of World War II."

NATIONAL PARK SERVICE COMMEMORATES THE 71ST ANNIVERSARY OF THE PORT CHICAGO EXPLOSION

Join the National Park Service and the Friends of Port Chicago National Memorial to honor the 320 men who lost their lives in the largest WWII military disaster on the home front.

Visitors are invited to attend the ceremony at 10 AM on Saturday July 18, at the site of the catastrophe, which occurred on July 17, 1944, at Port Chicago Naval Magazine in Concord, when two ships being loaded with ammunition exploded.

This annual event is a rare opportunity for friends, family, and others interested in the Port Chicago disaster and its aftermath to join together in a day of remembrance.

As the event will be held on an active military base, all visitors must have reservations and a security check. Visitors age 17 and under must be accompanied by an adult, but do not need to provide the information below. When reserving a spot, please be ready to give the following:

- **Daytime phone number**
- **The number from your state-issued driver's license and state that issued ID.**

You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.






