MAY 8 PROGRAM TRACES HERCULES POWDER WORKS HISTORY

Pinole and Hercules are really one place together. Life in the two valleys of Pinole and Hercules has been inextricably linked since 1878, when ruthless and visionary men bought the lands of Refugio Valley for a dynamite factory.

Hercules was incorporated by DuPont in 1900; for nearly 75 years its population remained under 300. This company town housed workers, technicians, and managers, closely linked with Pinole.

Dynamite transformed the explosives industry — and made our modern industrial world possible. San Francisco was the cradle of the dynamite industry in America. More than 15 companies established dynamite plants around the Bay. Mankind's mastery of the energy of chemical explosives is fundamental to every aspect of our life today.

The story of Hercules is the earliest story of technological and industrial innovation that assured California's place on the global stage.

Author and Hercules Historical Society historian Steve Lawton will tell the real story of Hercules, from its early days until now, with documented historical facts, rare photographs and maps never before seen. You'll learn about the rough industrial



pioneers, daily life in the company town, business during wartime, the post-war decline, the conversion to suburbia, the financial crises, and yes, the deadly explosions.

Join us Friday, May 8, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in conference rooms 2A and 2B of the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building, 1301 Pinole Valley Road.

You'll hear the story of California Powder Works, DuPont, and the Hercules Powder Company, which produced one of the first internationally branded products: Hercules dynamite. The Hercules story is a big book of California history, including chapters of the Civil War, the Transcontinental Railroad, and the destruction of San Francisco.

For years this was the largest dynamite factory in the world. Chinese laborers were, for a time, the backbone of a rugged workforce performing dangerous tasks. It was the largest producer of TNT during World War I, the "Chemists' War."

Breakthroughs in chemical technology were made by scientists working on "The Hill" at Quinan Hall.

Farsighted managers built one of the first industrial hospitals in America, and a pioneering social club; these buildings, and more, survive today.

Author and Hercules Historical Society historian Stephen Lawton will provide a glimpse into the interesting history and stories of this nearly 100-year-old explosives factory that gave the city its name.

Though the powder works sometimes went boom in the night (and day), the facility played a significant and decisive role in the U.S. Army's containment of fires started by the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and produced much of the explosives used by Allied forces in World War I and World War II.

ONE FILM REMAINS IN WWII SERIES ABOUT WOMEN ON THE HOME FRONT AND BEYOND

The *Josephine Baker Story*," a 1991 film about the life of the ingenue and ex-pat entertainer who stayed in France during WWII and helped Jews escape the Nazis, will be shown Tuesday, May 12, aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored cargo ship built in Richmond during World War II. The ship is owned and operated by the Richmond Museum Association and is also part of Rosie the Riveter/ WWII Home Front National Historical Park.


It's the final film in the "Women on the Home Front and Beyond" film series. This film is rated R; no one under 17 will be admitted without a parent.

Admission is free, but there is a suggested donation of \$10 to help preserve and maintain the ship.

Boarding begins at 6:30 p.m. and the film begins at 7 p.m.

The SS Red Oak Victory is located in historic Shipyard #3 at 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. For directions to the shipyard, visit the Red Oak Victory at www.ssredoakvictory.com/contact.htm.

Please note: The ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be able to climb the gangplank (40 feet of



stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard.

Remember to wear warm clothing, as it can be chilly aboard the ship!

Inclement weather may force the ship staff to cancel this program for safety reasons. If it rains, please call the ship at 510-237-2933 by 5:30 p.m. on the day of the screening to find out if the show will go on.

AUTHOR TO DISCUSS LITTLE-KNOWN INTERNMENT OF GERMAN NATIONALS DURING WWII

Heidi Gurcke Donald to tell her personal story of extradition from Latin America to the United States

On Saturday, May 9, at 11 a.m., the National Park Service will welcome author Heidi Gurcke Donald to speak about her new book, “We Were Not the Enemy,” at Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park.

During World War II, the United States used tactics remarkably similar to those in use today against presumed terrorists.

By 1939, President Franklin Roosevelt covertly authorized J. Edgar Hoover’s Secret Intelligence Service to begin surveillance of Axis nationals in Latin America.

Believing that “all German nationals without exception [are] dangerous,” the United States surreptitiously pressured Latin-American countries to arrest and deport more than four thousand civilians of German ethnicity to the United States. There, many languished in internment camps, while others were shipped to war-torn Germany.

Heidi Donald is a native of Costa Rica who was deported to the United States with six family members and interned at Crystal City, Texas, during World War II. “We Were Not the Enemy,”

You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.






