

PHS IMAGES USED IN WELLS FARGO BANK BRANCH MURAL

Historic images of Pinole's rich history, beginning with the El Rancho Pinole land grant of 1823, will be featured in a dramatic mural to be installed in the Wells Fargo Bank branch at 1374 Fitzgerald Drive, as part of the bank's Community Mural Program.

The installation will take place in late June or July. The Pinole Historical

Society and Wells Fargo Bank are planning an event for the unveiling.

Wells Fargo's Community Mural Program provides a unique visual enhancement to the customer experience in its Wells Fargo stores.

Designed to be a snapshot of Turn-of-the (Last)-Century America, historic images are chosen that convey a sense of history, tradition, stability,

longevity, optimism, and progress.

A typical mural design combines Wells Fargo images and local images that reflect the history and diversity of the community. An accompanying legend describes each historical image used in the mural.

The Pinole mural will be among nearly 2,000 in Wells Fargo Bank stores nationwide. Each

is unique to the area in which the bank store is located, and was developed with the aid of local archives and historians.

The Pinole mural includes images of a map of the land grant, the Martinez Adobe, downtown Pinole in the 1930s, Lawrence "Big Red" LeFebvre, the Pinole-Hercules School (the Old School), the Pinole Fire

President's Message

PINOLE GARDEN CLUB FOUNDER HONORED

Spring is here, and the early warmth and showers have caused many of our flowering trees, bushes, and flowers to bloom.

This gives me the opportunity to write about a very special person who was instrumental in starting the first Pinole-Hercules Garden Club in April 1956.

Mrs. James Baker, otherwise known as Lena Pearl (Judy) Baker (b. 1916 – d. 2012), was born in Logan, OK, and moved to Taft, CA, with her parents, where she grew up with four siblings. She married the love of her life, James (Jimmy) Baker in 1942; the marriage lasted more than 60 years.

Judy served her country loyally, building airplanes as a Rosie the Riveter during World War II, and taxiing them out of the hangers to the flight lanes in the Southern California desert. In the 1950s, the family moved to the Bay Area, settling in Richmond before mov-

ing to Pinole. Judy and Jimmy reared three children.

She belonged to Order of the Eastern Star, was a member of the Pocahontas women's organization, and attended the El Sobrante Baptist Church. She told it like it was.

Judy loved music, especially Elvis Presley. She was also one of Pinole's early reporters for the weekly Pinole-Hercules News, writing a column, "On Your Doorstep," which today is an historical accounting of some of the early residents of 1950s Pinole.

In 1955, Judy and several interested ladies met in the home of Mrs. Robert Lewis, with Mrs. Preston Raynor, Director of the California Garden Clubs, Inc. There they planned the Pinole-Hercules Garden Club. Their early objectives were to share their gardens and work to make their community and country beautiful.

The club was founded on April 12, 1956, with

Judy Baker (president), Marie Noonan, Isabel Catrino, Eleanore Olds, and Jessie Clark as the original members.

That year the Pinole-Hercules Garden Club had an anti-littering campaign, using National State Gardening Club standards. They were successful in getting people to be more aware of the beauty of clean neighborhoods.

For several years, the club met in the multipurpose room of the new Pinole-Hercules School

#2, now Margaret Collins Elementary School. The club now meets in the Alex Clark Community Room in the Pinole Public Safety Facility.

The club was privileged to have many speakers over the years on such topics as roses, fuchsias, dish gardens, hillside plantings, summer maintenance (watering, soil, and pest control). They covered holiday decorating, floral arranging, Christmas-tree lighting contests, garden contests, and collaborated with other organizations, including Rotary and the chamber of commerce.

The club's members have acquired a vast knowledge of gardening techniques.

Judy and her ladies were our first environmentalists. In the late 1950s, the club started the Penny Pines Bank Project. At nearly every meeting the Penny Bank is passed around for

 donations. The club's first purchase was "half of a plantation" of pine-tree seedlings (a plantation equals 3,250 trees), planted in forests that had been logged heavily to replace the cut-down trees for future growth.

The club still purchases trees every year, and has replaced many thousands of trees.

The club grew to nearly 30 members in 1957. "Hercules" was dropped from the club's name in 1964. There are too many to name, but all of these wonderful gardeners, along with their inspirational leader, Judy Baker, have given us a gift of beauty and community spirit we will always enjoy. The club's membership today numbers more than 50 of the 190,000 members of the National Garden Clubs, Inc.

To this day, the Pinole Garden Club celebrates



Arbor Day in April every year, planting a tree somewhere in Pinole. On April 22, the club met in Fernandez Park to honor their beloved founder, Judy Baker, with a special tree planting.

She was a very special lady indeed.

Jessie Clark's poem, "I'd Rather Plant," reflects this group of women. It was in the club's annual-meeting agenda book in 1960.

*I'd rather plant a tree by far
 Than chop one down you see,
 I'd rather plant some flowers to bloom
 Where weeds would often be.
 I'd rather plant a lawn to grow
 Soft green in shining sun,
 To beautify the landscape where
 Small girls and boys may run.*

"The Early Ranches of Pinole" will be our next PHS program

The Early Ranches of Pinole will be the program at the Pinole Historical Society's next membership meeting on Friday, May 17, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in conference rooms 2A and 2B of the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building.

As this is our annual meeting, PHS members will elect directors of the society.

The upper and lower Pinole Valley attracted 19th-century settlers whose livelihood depended on farming and ranch-

ing. The geography of rolling hills and fertile soil produced a ranching culture that drove Pinole's economy before and after the town's incorporation in 1903.

Cattle drives and caravans of hay and grain wagons from the valley hinterland were familiar sights for Pinoleans. This yearly parade came along Tennent Avenue through downtown to the bay-front railroad, warehouse, and wharf complex called Pinole Landing. The practice continued until the mid 1940s and 1950s.

Surrounding dairy farms provided locals with milk, butter, and cheese. However, in the 1920s and 1930s, tomatoes became the new cash crop of the Pinole Valley. By the 1950s and 1960s, the tomato fields and cattle-covered hillsides were replaced with homes, as Pinole became part of the new suburbia.

The streets of Pinole are a roll call of hard-working pioneer ranch names — Martinez, Tennent, Fernandez, Ellerhorst, Fitzgerald, Simas, Rose, Faria, Scanlan, Buckley, Silva, and Mohring.

Visit the new PHS exhibit, *The Early Ranches of Pinole*, at the Pinole Library. There are some interesting artifacts from Pinole's early history on display. This joins our two permanent exhibits.

Back in the day

CONGRATULATIONS TO SYBIL BARRERES

Celebrating her 96th birthday

May 1, 2013, will mark the 96th birthday of Pinole's most-senior pioneer resident, Sybil Barreres.

Born in 1917 in San Francisco, Sybil came to Pinole at age three to live in her grandmother's home on Samuel Street. Sybil still lives in the Queen Anne-style cottage built around 1900. It shows its age with plaster cracks from the 1906 earthquake and old Hercules Powder Company explosions.

"Thelma," as she was first named (but called Sybil after her grandmother, Sybil Meineke Brandt), has no such

breaks in her memory as she recounts her life events in Pinole. Sybil Meineke Brandt Moore Barreres is a fast-talking and fast-thinking fountain of local history.

Sybil is the oldest survivor of three sisters, Sybil, Elva, and Carol. Their parents were Claude and Carolyn (Carrie) Brandt Moore. Claude worked at Standard Oil, but died suddenly in 1927, leaving Carrie with three young children to rear. Carrie got a job as a telephone operator, working day and night shifts, in Louis Ruff's grocery store on southwest corner of Fernandez Street and San Pablo Avenue.

She also served as Pinole's city clerk into the 1950s.

Sybil remembers her youngest sister, Carol, being born in the old Pinole house around Christmas in the 1920s. The family had no name picked for the baby. So, Dr. Manuel Fernandez, who delivered the child, suggested Carol, since it was the Christmas season. And that became her baby sister's new name.

Sybil's family were 19th-century settlers who came west after the Civil War and ranched in the area west of downtown Pinole. Sybil recalls her grandmother Brandt

"hated milking cows and cried while doing so."

Her grandmother, Carolyn Sybil Meineke Brandt, and grandfather, Frederick Meineke Brandt, owned ranch property extending to today's Fosters Freeze and Green Lantern, north to Pinion Street and the Sportsman's Club and Santa Fe tracks.

After her grandfather's passing, her grandmother sold the ranch to the Buckley family. Her grandmother, Carolyn Brandt, moved to downtown Pinole, and in 1906 built the six homes on Pinole Valley Road called the Brandt Cottages. The lots were purchased from

the Ellerhorst family. The two-bedroom dwellings were nicknamed the "honeymoon cottages" and rented for \$15 a month.

Sybil grew up on steep-and-narrow Samuel Street, leading to the Pinole-Hercules School #1 atop the hill close to her home. She shared many of the teachers that had taught her mother, including Alice Ellerhorst (first grade), Elizabeth Stewart (third grade), and Frances Ellerhorst (eighth grade). For good attendance and high grades, Sybil received "half-holidays," a coveted reward of time off from school.

Sybil's memories stretch back to landmarks now gone. She describes the Pinole Opera House on Tennent Avenue as having "beautiful red-velvet wallpaper with lodge rooms upstairs and a dance hall and small cloakroom town library downstairs." She regrets as a teenager

sleeping through the opera house burning to the ground in 1931.

Sybil's Aunt Harriet, and Harriet's husband

Joe Lewis, ran a grocery store on a corner of Pinole Valley Road and San Pablo Avenue. In the 1920s, Sybil rode on

their horse and wagon delivering groceries with a dog named Star. She smiles as she remembers

Continued from page 9 having her first Coca-Cola at Jimmy Silvas' Golden West Hotel on the southwest corner of Tennent and San Pablo avenues, and shopping at nearby Greenfield's Department Store (southwest corner of Tennent Avenue and Pear Street), which had "everything under the sun and very steep stairs to the top."

Sybil took the bus to old Roosevelt High School in Richmond and graduated from Richmond High School in 1934. She remembers, "Anywhere you wanted to go outside of Pinole, you took the train—to Richmond, Crockett, or Martinez." She witnessed cowboys and cattle drives through downtown Pinole, as well as the building of the new, red brick Pinole Methodist Church on Pinole Valley Road in 1925. Eight-year-old Sybil and a friend walked through the wet plaster after workers left, tracking it home and angering her mother.

She also recalls how many homes and businesses on the north side of San Pablo Avenue lost their frontages when the road was widened in the 1920s. Her friend, Helen McDonald, lost most of her front yard, as did the Pinole Meat Market, which later became the Square Deal Garage. Helen McDonald was to also lose her father, Town Constable Jerry, shot to death in a Rodeo bank robbery in 1929.

Despite impaired vision, Sybil has always been an avid reader, lov-

ing mysteries. She looks back on the time in the 1920s when she would check out a book at 2 p.m. and have it back by 5 p.m. Her relative, Annette Brandt, was the town librarian for 36 years, and Sybil's uncle built Pinole's first 8x10 tin-roof library building for his wife in 1917.

With great humor, Sybil still can laugh about being chased around her yard by a goose, as well as Halloween pranks played by locals Charlie Ruff and Emmett (Pully) Walton, who knocked over outhouses and hoisted front-yard gates onto telephone poles.

However, it was no laughing matter on the morning of December 7, 1941, when she learned of the bombing of Pearl Harbor while working in Los Angeles.

"I could not believe what was happening," she said. She remembers being in a movie house

later that day watching a Greta Garbo movie and crying while military officers walked up and down the aisles telling men to report to their duty stations. People stopped their cars by the side of the road and gave

servicemen they did not know rides to San Pedro station.

Sybil married Joe Barreres of Pinole (now deceased) and has one son, David, and one grandson, Joe. Sybil and

Joe were long-time patrons of Tommy's Coffee Cup (now The Bear Claw) on San Pablo Avenue. Sybil and Gladys Prather, Tommy's wife, were good friends. Sybil and Joe did not have to order from the menu. Gladys had their usual order memorized—tuna salad sandwich, no crust for Sybil, and Denver omelette, no bell peppers for Joe.

Sybil has been an active Pocahontas Lodge member in Pinole for more than 50 years. She still makes the Wednesday-night meetings at the Sportsman's Club of one of Pinole's oldest organizations. She attributes her long life span to

"being half Irish and half German, with an edge on German."

Always friendly and ready to share her golden memories, Sybil is a living Pinole treasure. She possesses a fantastic knowledge of current, as well as past, events, and an energy level not even close to her years. She came from a time when neighbors lived next to one another for years, talking over back fences and knowing the names



May is the month to honor our servicemen and women

Americans celebrate Armed Forces Day annually on the third Saturday of May. This year it's May 18.

It is a day to pay tribute to men and women who serve in the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, and Coast Guard.


Armed Forces Day is also part of Armed Forces Week, which begins on the second Saturday of May. National Guard and Reserve units may celebrate Armed Forces Day/Week over any period in May because of their unique training schedules.

Events and activities may include:

- Multi-service military displays in areas open to the public.
- Educational activities for children.
- Large parades and other local celebrations.

First observed on May 20, 1950, the day was created on August 31, 1949, to honor Americans serving in the five U.S. military branches following their unification under one department – the Department of Defense.

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy established



Armed Forces Day as an official holiday. The country's longest-running city-sponsored Armed Forces Day parade is held in Bremerton, WA, which will have its 65th parade this year.

The first Armed Forces Day was celebrated by parades, open houses, receptions and air shows. In Washington D.C., 10,000 troops, cadets, and veterans marched past President Kennedy.

In Berlin, 1,000 U.S. troops paraded for the German citizens at Templehof Airfield. In New York City, an estimated 33,000 participants initiated Armed Forces Day under an air cover of 250 military planes.

In harbors across the country were the famed mothballed battlewagons of World War II – the Missouri, the New Jersey,

the North Carolina, and the Iowa, all open to the public.



Pinole's annual Memorial Day observance, hosted by the Boy Scouts, will take place Monday, May 27, at 11 a.m., at the Veterans Memorial in Fernandez Park. A barbecue will follow the ceremony.

50 years ago — 1963

May 1: The Coca-Cola Company introduced its first diet drink, TaB cola.

May 2: Hundreds of African-Americans, including children, were arrested as they set out from the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama to protest segregation. There were 959 people arrested on the first day, and two days later, Public Safety Commissioner Eugene "Bull" Connor ordered the use of dogs and fire hoses to repel new demonstrators, images of which were picked up by media around the world.

May 8: *Dr. No*, the first James Bond film, premiered in the United States, with Sean Connery as James Bond, Agent 007.

May 14: The Rolling Stones signed their first recording contract, with Decca Records.

May 18: Ernie Davis, 23, the African-American football star at Syracuse University who won the 1961 Heisman Trophy, died. He was diagnosed with leukemia after signing with the Cleveland Browns, and never played in a National Football League game.

June 11: Alabama Governor George C. Wallace stood in a doorway of the University of Alabama to protest against integration, before stepping aside and allowing African-Americans James Hood and Vivian Malone to enroll.

June 11: President John F. Kennedy broadcast an historic civil-rights address, in which he promised a Civil Rights Bill, and asked for "the kind of equality of treatment that we would want for ourselves."

June 12: Medgar Evers is murdered in Jackson, Mississippi.

June 17: The U.S. Supreme Court ruled that state-mandated Bible reading in public schools is unconstitutional.

June 19: Soviet Valentina Tereshkova, the first woman in space, returned to Earth.

June 21: Pope Paul VI (Giovanni Battista Montini) succeeded Pope John XXIII as the 262nd pope.

June 26: President John F. Kennedy gave his "Ich bin ein Berliner" speech in West Berlin.

July 1: ZIP Codes premiered as the U.S. Post Office Department kicked off an advertising campaign that included the cartoon character "Mr. ZIP."

July 2: Pitchers Juan Marichal, of the San Francisco Giants, and Warren Spahn, of the Milwaukee Braves, faced off against each other at

Candlestick Park. Tied, 0-0, after nine innings, the Giants won, 1-0, in the 16th on a home run by Willie Mays. Both pitchers pitched the entire game.

July 19: A 25-pound bomb was inadvertently dropped on downtown San Francisco by a U.S. Navy Reserve pilot on a routine exercise flight. The unarmed bomb fell at the intersection of Market and Front streets, bounced over the eight-story IBM building, and damaged another building three blocks away, but nobody was injured.

July 25: Representatives of the United States, the United Kingdom and the Soviet Union initialed the Partial Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, the agreement for the banning of nuclear weapons tests in the atmosphere, outer space, and under water. The treaty, derided by China, was signed on August 5 in Moscow.




